I avoid the news at the moment because it is too horrifying to watch. I can't do anything to stop Brexit, I can't do enough on my own to stop global warming, I can't solve the problem of the huge gap between rich and poor that is growing every larger, in this country and globally. It seems we are heading for total disaster as a nation and as a planet.

The state of our nation and the state of the world are not accidents, they are consequences of the actions of each of us. We are responsible for what has happened. Blaming other people is easy, but the truth is we are all to blame. We enjoy a comfortable lifestyle in this country at a huge cost to other people and the environment.

We are not isolated individuals, we are connected with every other human being, with every other plant and animal on this planet. What we do affects all life. When we fill the oceans with toxic waste then we destroy the life that we depend on. When we demand cheap food for ourselves then we reduce the wages of agricultural workers. When we fill our roads with lorries emitting toxic diesel fumes then the communities closest to those roads suffer from a higher risk of lung and heart problems. There is a madness about the way we are behaving as a species. We are destroying each other and the planet we depend on for every breath we take.

The only answer is to return to the one who created us and all life and listen to what He has to say about how best we can organise our world. In the Old Testament, in Leviticus, we read about the concept of Jubilee: a year when slaves were to be set free, when debts were to be written off, when the land itself was to be rested and not ploughed or sown. A rest from making money from each other, a rest from plundering the earth for profit. I'm told that it was never properly implemented, that people ignored it as a strange unprofitable idea that would never make them rich.

In the New Testament we have the wisdom of the Son of God, who spoke more about money than any other topic. Jesus warned His followers to beware of becoming attached to material possessions and money:

"Don't store up treasures here on earth, where moths eat them and rust destroys them, and where thieves break in and steal.<sup>20</sup> Store your treasures in heaven, where

moths and rust cannot destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. <sup>21</sup> Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be."

All so different from what I expected but so very glad it was.

# What impact did the weekend have on you?/What changes occurred in you after your weekend?

I don't think there was a profound change after that weekend, more of a gradual one in effect. I think the first weekend I staffed had more of an impact. The privilege of being asked; helping the participants feel at home and listening to the talks again. For me staffing along with our group re-unions give structure and a deeper understanding of my relationship with God and my place in the community.

My faith has become stronger and more deep rooted thanks to Cursillo and it holds me in place during the dark days.

I'm now 4<sup>th</sup> day officer and a member of the Secretariat. I took on that role in November following on from Sue Joy. I'm still finding my feet, so to speak, and there's probably a lot more to it than I've yet realised. The Officer co-ordinates with the Lay rectors of the various 4<sup>th</sup> day communities in Cheshire. There are four meetings a year; two to organise the palanca needs for the weekends and two pastoral ones, hopefully with Eucharist. Here we discuss how each 4<sup>th</sup> day community is faring and whether prayers or practical help.....or both .... are needed.

#### What's your favourite way to spend a day off?

What I do on my days off depends on how energetic I feel. On lazy days there's nothing better than curling up with a good book and letting the outside world go by. On more energised days I paint or patchwork. It's all about colour; putting it together to make a scene or a quilt. Deeply satisfying. And there we are....me, in a nutshell!

My Cursillo by John Hulme, Chester Cursillo #58

God's love doesn't work by bundling you into the back of a van and kidnapping you into His heart. But if it did, it might leave you feeling a little like I do after my Cursillo experience.

I had very little idea what to expect when going on a Cursillo weekend. A friend of mine told me about it over a meal one evening - some kind of short Christian thing he had been involved with, and an experience he thought I might wish to look into if I ever got the chance.

I mentioned this to another couple of other people in the following days, and they both said they had heard good things about it, and that it might be good for me. Feeling more and more curious, I looked it up online and watched a couple of

YouTube videos. I still wasn't really sure what to expect, but something just seemed to tug at me. So I applied to go on the next local weekend, which was little more than a month away. I got a response very quickly: very friendly, very accommodating and still leaving me with no clear idea what I was in for.

It wasn't deliberate secrecy. Nobody was preparing to send me on any international espionage missions. The fact is, it's just very difficult to prepare anyone for what happens on a Cursillo weekend.

On the surface, it is simply a course - a series of short talks, discussions and meditations to build up a picture of the Christian life. But what really makes Cursillo stand out is the way this happens, the environment in which you find yourself. As the weekend progresses, you find yourself increasingly, sometimes overwhelmingly seduced by a sense of being held, valued and loved.

## <u>Restored and Forgiven by Ray and Vi Donovan, pub. Bridge Logos.</u> <u>-A book review by Lew Riches</u>

I recommend you read the back outside cover first. It frightened and shocked me. It challenged me to read on. Even the endorsements were a challenge for me to over come. Every page has something that challenged my view of the world, that shook my view of reality up and down. Every chapter had something that made me gasp. Why? Because I know it is the absolute truth. How? Because I heard the story directly from Ray and Vi over a period of 2 weekends even before I'd heard about the book. That means when I'd finished reading it I had and have a different view of : God, murderers, the police, justice as a philosophy, forgiveness, restorative justice and reconciliation. Equally I know, now that individual people can and do change aspects of society they feel strongly about.

This book is not a religious textbook. It is a statement of how a parents love for their son fortified by their faith drove them on to survive murder, to forgive and become reconciled with the murderers and to champion remarkable changes for restorative justice.
