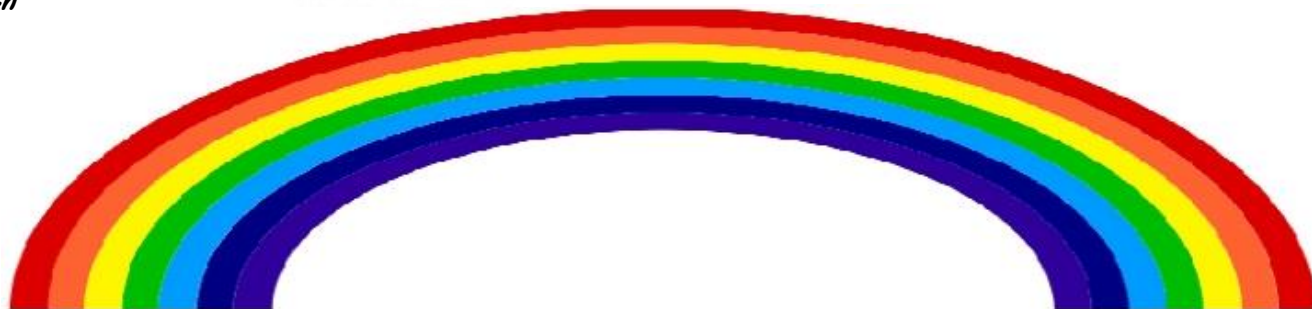

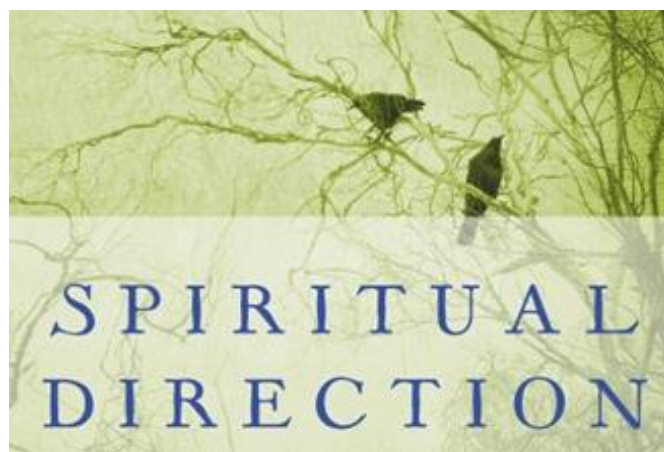

- Previous experience in the role of NSD (then known as BACC Vice- President) from 2001 to 2004.
- An extensive knowledge and understanding of Cursillo, gained through personal experience and also thoroughly immersing myself in the foundational literature of the movement, including The Fundamental Ideas of the Cursillo Movement (1st, 2nd and 3rd editions) and various editions of the Leaders' Manual and the official Talk Outlines.
- Over thirty years of stipendiary ordained parochial ministry in a variety of contexts from leafy Metroland suburbia to inner-city multi-faith multi-cultural Southall, seeing Cursillo transform lives and build up the church in all these places.
- Considerable pastoral experience and the ability to offer a listening ear, theological reflection and spiritual counsel.
- The ability to articulate the essence of Cursillo to a variety of audiences, including devising and running clergy workshops on Cursillo which were successful in recruiting clergy who themselves became leaders in the movement.

My name is Betty Thompson, I attended Derby 6# weekend in 2002

I shall never regret becoming a Cursillista I am inspired again and again when meeting in Group Prayer, or an Ultreya or any National Cursillo venue to be with sisters and brothers in Cursillo who hold the same visions and views the Lord leads us to do in our daily lives.

MY CURSILLO STORY

A reflection by Shirley Salisbury from St Asaph diocese –

About eleven years ago I was invited to a Cursillo meeting and I really felt that it would be the right thing to do to attend a 'weekend'. Whilst always a Christian, This is when I found that God wanted me to do something with my life, I just had to find out what! I found that Cursillo brought me out of my shell and gradually the quiet, timid Shirley bloomed. You know what they say 'bloom where you are planted', and over the years I tried a variety of things to try and find my mission for God. I spoke to a few friends and sought their wisdom and together, we came up with some ideas.

Eventually I got the go ahead to become the 'hard copy' palanca secretary as well as making cards for fundraising and coming up with other ideas as the St Asa[h 'fundraiser'. Making my own cards meant that I would receive requests for people who needed a visible prayer, such as after a bereavement or illness. This expanded to not only Cursillistas, but to people within our Mission Area, which meant that I was also having a hand in advertising Cursillo more widely A fellow Cursillista and myself also took leaflets to every church in the Mission Area. We quickly expanded this so that whenever there were any ordinations in the pipeline, I would make cards for each ordinand in both St Asaph and



neighbouring Bangor diocese and each would get an individual card. Many, I later learned, knew nothing about Cursillo so I was pleased to have identified another possible marketing 'tool'.

I told them my fellow secretariat members that I would never be able to lead a tea although I loved serving on team many times. However, one day, my name came to the top of the list and I was invited to become Lay Rector for a Cursillo. Through my card making, attending GB Ultreyas each year until I became less able to get out and other Cursillo activities, I have made many dear friends far and wide. Many collect old cards and other art materials to enable me to carry on making cards to send on as palanca. I am very grateful for all these donations. I receive a lot of feedback from people who receive the cards, saying how happy it made them to receive one – often lifting their spirits at a difficult time in their life. In turn, I am happy to know that they like them and it makes my life enriched to know that I am working for God in my own little corner.

THE AUTHENTIC CURSILLO no secrecy



When you are asked to describe what goes on during The Cursillo (known as 'The Weekend but altered to The Cursillo in the advent of Cursillo's taking place in all sorts of variations) there are no boundaries around what you can share. Of course, it may be better to hold back on describing some of the surprises you include in your own dioceses. However, what you can and should share, are that The Cursillo includes 15 short talks, 5 meditations and 3 eucharists (added as an essential part of the gathering)

If you are encouraging and supporting someone to join a Cursillo you should explain that this is a reflective process. You can explain what the talks and meditations will be about. Some Dioceses have their own leaflet to hand out about the contents (London Cursillo is one such example)

A BEACON OF YOUTHFUL HOPE IN NORWICH PRISON

The Kairos Torch Prisoner Christian Rehabilitation Programme is about to start in HMP Norwich. Dr Ian Watson, County Ecumenical Officer, who attended an evening of talks on the initiative reports.

Kairos Torch Prison Ministry for 18-25 year-olds - Written by a Cursillista from Taverham.

This adventure with God that began on a hot summers Saturday evening in June 2025 in an Airbnb in the Lincolnshire fens miles from anyone I knew. After a long, lovely day at a stitching festival, I was just dozing off when I heard a voice calling "Jane, Jane". I was spooked! It was 2am!

How can someone be calling my name?

When I calmed down, I realised just like Samuel in the Bible Old Testament (1 Samuel Chapter 3) I had heard the audible voice of God and out loud I said, "Ok I hear you, I will do what you are calling me too, if you show me the way".

I determined at that moment not to return to the stitching festival the next day but to go to the 9:30am service at the C of E church just down the road.

They sang four hymns, one of which was, "Will you come and follow me if I but call your name?" I smiled and, in my heart, said, "OK Lord, I hear you, you lead I'll follow, but you will have to show me where we are going!"

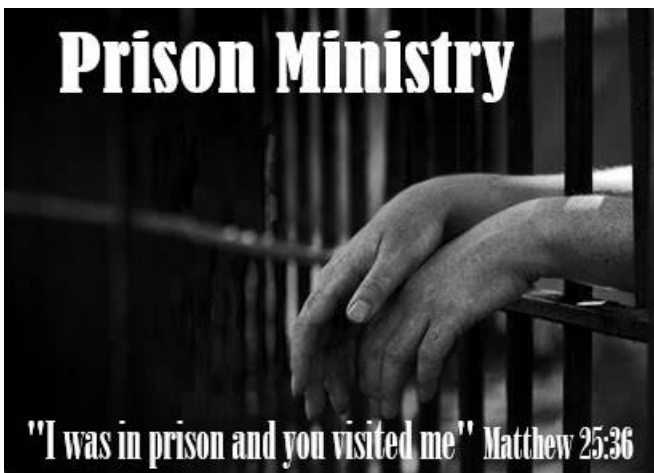
The following Saturday we had a gathering for members of our local Cursillo (the best kept secret in the Anglican church!) and we had a visitor called Richard Stephens spoke about the Kairos Prison Ministry. He was seeking volunteers to be part of a pioneering team to go into Norwich Prison with the Kairos Torch Ministry for 18–25-year-old offenders as it had never been run anywhere in the UK before.

I knew this was why God had called my name as I was moved to tears as Richard spoke. I signed up. The rest they say is history!

I was selected to join the team at a meeting in Cambridge and had to attend a residential training weekend and two more training days

Because we had to experience for ourselves what the young men would experience. We shared our life stories and were completely open with each other which was very healing for us.

Our final team of 12 included a chap who travelled from USA and two Kairos newbies from Norwich. The others were all experienced in Kairos for adult prisoners.



Our 3 days in Norwich prison were challenging, amazing and life changing, not just for the me and the team but for the chaps who attended. We started with 10 names. 9 arrived and 2 left after first 30 minutes. The other 7 stuck with us, and we watched as amazing changes took place in them. These 7 became known as the "Norwich 7".

None of this would have been possible without the tireless efforts of the Prison Chaplaincy because they know that behind every prison door is a broken heart and Jesus heals the broken hearted, a heart hardened by abuse can be softened by divine love, a memory distorted by guilt will respond to an offer of divine forgiveness. A mind that is confused can be clarified by divine wisdom, a conscience that is seared can be renewed by the guidance of the Holy Spirit and trust that has been destroyed by abuse can be healed by human kindness offered over a sustained period.

Some of the team will continue to meet with the "Norwich 7" on a weekly basis to mentor them and help them continue the new path they have found.

The journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step, and the motto of Kairos is:

"Listen, Listen, Love,".

Love is the key that unlocks the chains and enables the change because in every situation.... Love wins.

WORDS FROM A SERMON

With kind permission from Rev'd Jonathon Smith –Church in Wales

If ever I used the word 'hate' as a child, my mother would not be pleased. That's a very strong word, she would counsel. You should hardly ever use it. We have heard much of the word recently especially in relation to yesterday's terrible shooting at a synagogue in Manchester. The Chief Rabbi said of the attack '...it is the tragic result of an unrelenting wave of Jew hatred.'

There is something menacing about the word 'hate' which suggests violence and revenge. In the bible, we do see the word used. Towards the end of that beautiful Psalm 139 it appears in verses 21 & 22. The hatred here is turned on those who speak of God maliciously, those who rise up against God. In Luke 14.26 when Jesus talks of the cost of following him, he tells those who come to him who do not hate their own family members that they cannot be his disciples. In the psalm, the word is used to show loathing and distaste for anything which opposes the ways of a loving God.

Jesus uses it to speak of the intense loyalty we should have for him compared to other loyalties. Hate does not have to be about bloodletting, just a strong carefully held view especially against all that is wrong. As society seeks to address the crimes of those who turn hate into violence and abuse, we should be careful to allow expression of opinions we disagree with in the right contexts. We do well to heed Peter's advice: *'Above all, maintain constant love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins.'* 1 Peter 4.8

What other wise words of advice does The bible give us about discrimination? These are but a few:-

[Galatians 5:14](#) ES

For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself

[James 2:2-4](#)

For if a man wearing a gold ring and fine clothing comes into your assembly, and a poor man in shabby clothing also comes in, and if you pay attention to the one who wears the fine clothing and say, "You sit here in a good place," while you say to the poor man, "You stand over there," or, "Sit down at my feet," have you not then made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts?

We have already heard from other Cursillistas in this edition about how they discerned God’s ministry within themselves. This is a personal journey where waiting on the Lord can sometimes become frustrating. Nevertheless, remember how Christ used to spend a great deal of time alone, waiting upon his Father to guide him on the next steps of His journey on earth.

We ask - ‘who am I? What is my calling? This is not to achieve greatness, it is to offer ourselves as a vessel of service. Whatever your calling, be it a pastor of a huge church or a lay member, in God’s eyes you are no more, and no less, than a servant. In God’s kingdom class distinctions do not count. ‘There is neither Jew, nor Greek, slave nor free man... male nor female... for you are all one in Christ Jesus *Galatians 3:28*

We are servants called to do the will of God, wherever he appoints us to serve. And that is a good thing! In being a servant there is relief from the ‘pressure to perform’. No-one has the right to judge you except your Master. ‘Who are you to judge the servant of another? To his own master he stands or fails *Romans 14:4*

We should be concerned with what pleases God, not people. He alone can evaluate our service. Jesus came to serve His Father, saying ‘I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which has sent me ‘ *John 5:30*

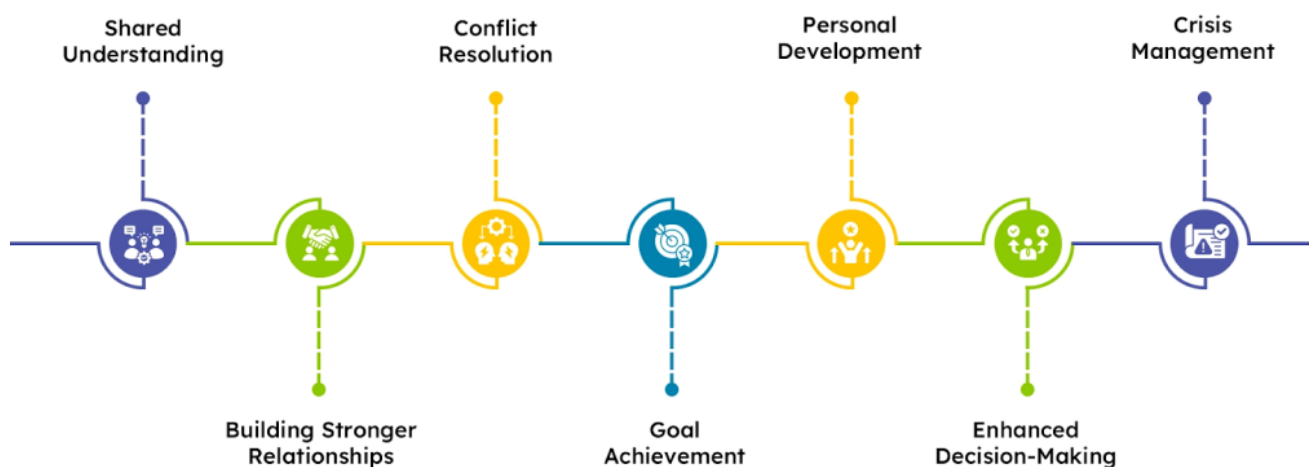
